The Secretariat for Catholic Human Services of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia is comprised of four divisions: Catholic Social Services and affiliated nonprofit organizations; Catholic Health Care Services; Nutritional Development Services; and the Office of Community Development. The ministries and services provided by Catholic Human Services impact a quarter of a million men, women and children throughout the five country region.

The audited financial statements presented for Catholic Social Services include the following entities:

The Catholic Health Care Services audited financial statements are presented in a consolidated format. The following entities are included in the consolidated financial statements: St. John Neumann Nursing Home, Immaculate Mary Home, St. Mary Manor, St. Martha Manor, St. Francis Country House, and St. Monica Manor. Each of these skilled nursing care facilities is owned and operated by Catholic Health Care Services. Each offers expert nursing care and rehabilitation for seniors on both a short-term and long-term basis. Villa St. Martha, an independent living and personal care senior residential community, is also owned and operated by Catholic Health Care Services and is included in the consolidated financial statements presented.

Nutritional Development Services (NDS), whose audited financial statements are also presented, provides meals, food assistance and additional support to organizations that serve children and the poor. NDS sponsors the Child Nutrition Programs under the regulations of the US Department of Agriculture. Meals are provided to children in parochial, charter and private schools, child care centers, after-school and summer programs. Through the Community Food Programs, NDS conducts food drives throughout the year to assist parishes and other community organizations in meeting the nutritional needs of the hungry in the five county Philadelphia region.

The Office for Community Development Corporation serves as a catalyst for the revitalization of distressed neighborhoods. It seeks to establish partnerships that improve the quality of life for all by encouraging community economic development, beautification of neighborhoods and reduction of blight, enhancement of educational opportunities, increased housing opportunities as well as promotion of safe and healthy

living environments. Since an audit was not performed for the Office for Community Development, their financial statements are not presented
